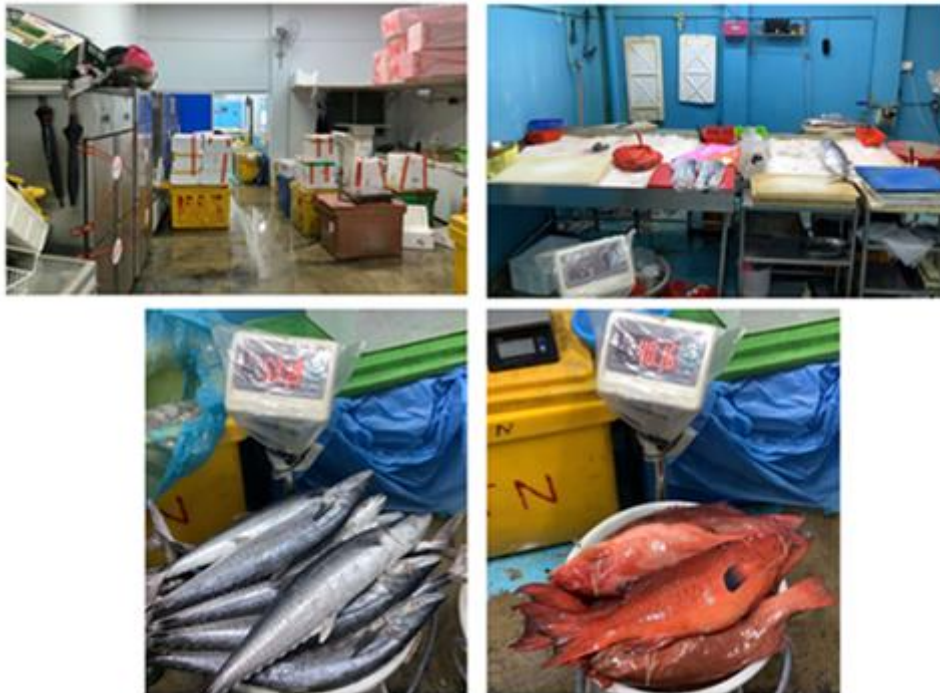


The 11th Street Private Limited fined \$16,000 for illegally processing and storing seafood products in unlicensed premises

The 11th Street Private Limited, a seafood supplier, was fined \$16,000 by the Court today for illegally processing and storing seafood products in unlicensed premises.

2 In a targeted operation on 27 October 2022, SFA uncovered an illegal seafood processing facility operating out of a landed residential property at 9 Toh Avenue. Investigations revealed that 11th Street Pte Ltd had used the residential premises to operate a processing establishment without a license. Seafood items, such as Batang Fish, Red Grouper fish and prawns, weighing approximately 2.4 tonnes, were seized.

3 Illegal processing and storage of meat and fish at unlicensed facilities poses a food safety risk. In Singapore, all meat and/or fish processing facilities and all storage facilities for meat and/or seafood products must be licensed, and are required to meet SFA's requirements and food safety standards. These licensed establishments are also routinely inspected by SFA. SFA will continue to step up enforcement checks to ensure safe food for all. Offenders who illegally process meat and fish shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$10,000 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months, or both. Offenders who are in possession of meat and/or fish products stored in an unlicensed processing establishment shall be liable on conviction to a maximum fine of \$50,000 or imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years or to both,.
