

Developing the Singapore Aquaculture Plan together with all Stakeholders

Two sub-committees to co-develop the <u>Singapore Aquaculture Plan</u> (SAP) and transform the aquaculture sector to be more productive and sustainable has been formed.

2 The two sub-committees will help to foster collective visioning and flesh out our shared vision with actionable outcomes for the SAP to uplift the aquaculture sector. Consisting of diverse members from government agencies, nature groups, academia, farmers, and off-takers (food distributors and retailers), the two sub-committees will focus on sustainable aquaculture as well as productive aquaculture. 3 Food security is an existential issue for Singapore. We currently import more than 90 per cent of our food, which makes us vulnerable to food supply disruptions due to factors like climate change and disease outbreaks. To ensure our food resilience, we have set a "30 by 30" vision - to build the capability and capacity of our agri-food industry to sustainably produce 30 per cent of our nutritional needs by 2030. Singapore's aquaculture sector contributes significantly to our "30 by 30", and fish has been identified as a nutritious source of protein that can be produced efficiently in land scarce Singapore.

4 The sub-committees will be chaired by SFA's Deputy CEO Chan Hian Lim, with Senior Minister of State for Sustainability and the Environment, Dr Koh Poh Koon, as Advisor. Mr Chan Hian Lim, Deputy CEO of SFA, said: "I am privileged to lead the SAP's sub-committees, championing collaboration to transform the aquaculture industry into a sustainable and productive sector to significantly bolster Singapore's food security. Through collective strength from robust partnerships and synergistic efforts among all stakeholders, Singapore is poised to be the leading research and innovation cluster for sustainable tropical aquaculture."



5 Dr Toh Tai Chong (member of the sub-committee on sustainable aquaculture), Cofounder of Our Singapore Reefs, said: "Aquaculture in Singapore is a complex challenge given our limited sea space, multiple uses, and the presence of highly sensitive habitats. The diversity of stakeholders represented in the SAP committee has created a muchneeded platform for us to learn from each other and to co-create solutions to rise above this challenge. The nature groups present in the SAP have benefitted greatly from our engagements with our government agencies, academics, and farmers, and we are committed to give our best to make sustainable aquaculture in Singapore a reality."

6 Mr Ken Cheong (Co-Lead, sub-committee on productive aquaculture), CEO of Singapore Agro-Food Enterprises Federation, said: "The aquaculture sector holds great potential in coming together to spearhead growth to address Singapore's food security concerns. We are not starting from zero as we have kickstarted many transformation efforts, and I am both honoured and excited to continue being part of the team leading the change. I am confident that with concerted effort across industry players, offtakers, and research institutes, the industry can be transformed into one that is vibrant, inclusive and a source of confidence for the nation."
