Importer fined \$4,600 for illegal import of fresh and processed vegetables

Neo Teck Yong, licensee of He Sheng Vegetable Supplier, was fined \$4,600 by the Court today for illegally importing fresh and processed vegetables for sale on two occasions.

On 13 July 2021, officers from Singapore Food Agency (SFA) detected 351kg of undeclared fresh vegetables and 24.8kg of undeclared processed vegetables in the consignments imported from Malaysia by Neo. On 2 June 2022, 47.4 kg of undeclared processed vegetable was detected in a consignment imported from Malaysia by Neo.

- In Singapore, food imports must meet SFA's requirements. Fruits and vegetables can only be imported by licensed importers, and every consignment must be declared and accompanied with a valid import permit. Illegally imported vegetables are of unknown sources and can pose a food safety risk (e.g. if unregulated or high level of pesticides are used). The long-term ingestion of excessive pesticide residues through the consumption of vegetables that have been subjected to pesticide abuse could lead to adverse health effects.
- Offenders who illegally import fresh fruits and vegetables shall be liable on conviction to a maximum fine of \$10,000 and/or imprisonment for a term not exceeding three years. Offenders who illegally import processed fruits and vegetables shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$1,000 and in the case of a subsequent conviction, to a fine not exceeding \$2,000.
